Probably the most activity over the last three months has been to find lost Outlaws and locate former members of our Outlaw nation in all year groups. We continue to lose contact with some of the original VLOA members for a number of reasons. My article in this newsletter discusses this further. And, our search team continues to look for ways to identify former members of the Outlaws, Mavericks, Roadrunners, 28th Signal Detachment and 25<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division gunners from all year groups and Iraq. It is good to report that we are beginning to find a number of them, with sufficient information that we can now include them on our membership roster and add their names to our website. Some are submitting their membership applications. To those new members, welcome aboard. We are glad to have you join us and hope to see you in Nashville on September 30.

We continue receiving registration forms for our 2010 Outlaw Nashville Roundup scheduled for September 30 through October 4. To date, we have nine couples registered. The initial suspense date for submitting registration forms is June 1, with a minimum of 50 percent of the registration costs included with the registration. Final date for full payment and registration for the Roundup is August 1. Payments must be sent to Charles Bouton at his address reflected on the registration form. The Gaylord Opryland Hotel will not take reservations directly from the VLOA membership; all registrations must come to the VLOA for processing. A registration form, schedule of Roundup events, and reunion shirt order form are included elsewhere in this newsletter.

We have selected the reunion shirt and hat, and contacted the provider to be ready to respond to our request when the reunion registration forms arrive. A shirt order form is included in this newsletter, and the hat will be provided as part of the Roundup attendee's welcome packet for the men. Thanks go to Tom Anderson and Bill Hensinger for working the shirt and hat issue to a final decision.

# A VISIT TO A PROUD LADY

About a year ago, Outlaw Phil Horne, knowing I lived in Arkansas told me that it might be worthwhile for me to visit a proud lady of his acquaintance residing in Walnut Ridge in the NE part of Arkansas. From my home in the NW corner of the state it appeared 180 mile trip, doable in one day. Phil provided a contact phone number in Walnut Ridge and a call later I was invited to come over for a visit. Summer blended into fall, then winter and the trip was delayed further for one reason or another until a few days before spring this year.

Confirming telephone calls were made with the Walnut Ridge contact and a date was set for the visit. I departed one Friday afternoon bound for Walnut Ridge, Arkansas. Stopped short at Hardy, Arkansas for an overnight and meal. Early the next day on to Walnut Ridge, a short hour road travel. Hit a barber shop just opening at 7 AM as I was in need of a dog license or haircut. Settled on the latter; had a short stack of pancakes at Monie's café recommended by the barber. As expected, the café was the gathering place for the locals, lots of chatter, laughter, visiting and wait-resses bantering with the customers while providing endless refills of coffee mugs.

Back to the parked car, a quick telephone call to Jason Hammock, my contact, host and guide for the day. A ten mile backtrack and rendezvous with Jason at a highway café parking lot in Black Rock. Brief introductories were made; then a "follow me" five mile or so drive winding generally south from the highway and arrived at the proud lady's home. There stood her beautiful 8,000 square foot home, complete with high beamed ceilings and well lit. I entered the home and there she stood erect, both feet squarely and firmly planted on the polished floor. Jason introduced me and I was immediately struck by her pristine appearance, although not dressed in the colors I remembered of some 45 to 46 years ago. Yes, I was looking at UH-1B known as Outlaw 11 (Army Serial Number 63-8704) now bearing the tail number of N 64771 and we were in Jason's spotless hangar (Photo #1- OL 11). More about Jason later.

A slow walk around OL 11 with Jason's help looking in all the inspection doors, engine compartment, crew compartment and then climbing on board to sit in the pilot's seat. OD paint in most all interior parts attested to her origin; instruments, flight controls and crew seats all appeared original or at least Army reconditioned or new with few exceptions (Photo #2). OL 11 has indeed been cared for along her long journey during 7,200 hours of flight, and Jason has given her that same TLC provided by the original Crew Chief, CE Phil Horne. The photos are evidence of OL 11's present condition. Seeing OL 11 and sitting in the pilot's seat many memories flowed through my mind of Vinh Long days, some of which shared with Jason as he has a deep interest in history the VN period and Army Aviation.

OL 11 has a long and interesting history in her journey from VN to Jason's Hangar. Briefly, OL 11 was retrofitted as a gunship in '65-'66, retrograded to CONUS sometime then to ARADMAC for overhaul/reconditioning, assignment to various Army units then on the National Guard duty in OH and CO, deactivated and eventually sold by US Government to the Los Angeles Fire and Rescue Department, and finally acquired by Jason in 2004. Full details of OL 11's 46 year journey would require another story.

Following Jason's purchase of OL 11 he checked out in the aircraft and obtained his commercial helicopter rating in that aircraft. Jason purchased the aircraft for special use clearing electric and gas pipe line right of ways with the device in Photo # 3. A 4 cylinder 20 hp gas engine drives ten 12 inch circular saw blades affixed to a rigid boom. For operation, a long tubular boom attached to the device is hooked up to the helicopter cargo hook and hoisted aloft. The engine driven saws can be stopped and started from the cockpit. When operating in this mode the device is used to cut overhanging branches and brush from the right of ways. High degree of pilot skill and proficiency is required during these operations plus the fact that during most operations the helicopter is in a slow hover out of ground effect.

Now, a little background on Jason Hammock (Photo # 4). Thirty eight years old, stands 6 feet 2 inches and weighs 240 pounds. His build would indicate a football line backer or bruising running back. But, he only excelled in basketball since his small high school did not have a football team. His interest in aviation was sparked by his stepfather, Renny and Renny's two brothers all involved in aerial application work. Jason soloed at 16 in a Cessna 150 which he had purchased in run down condition and rebuilt himself. Although encouraged to pursue further schooling, he dropped out after a year of college for he knew a flying career was for him. *(continued on page 4)*

Jason garnered additional commercial ratings and qualification as an aerial applicator attending a specialized school for such pilots. Now, some 20 years later and with 7,800 flying hours Jason's operation includes the UH-1B never used, or intended to be used for crop dusting; one AG CAT with a radial engine and two AG CATS with turbine engines. Rounding out his hangar of aircraft is a Cessna 150 for personal use and pleasure. Recently, his younger brother Chris, following the family career tradition obtained his commercial fixed wing and rotorcraft/helicopter ratings and plans to become an aerial applicator (crop duster) pilot. Jason lives on his 240 acre farm with his wife Kim and three daughters, Katelyn, Kaylie and Hannah. With flying in the blood lines no telling what career those young ladies may pursue. He hangars OL 11 and a occasional AG CAT there on the farm along the side of his 2,200 foot grass strip.

To cap off my day, Renny invited me for a tour of their FAA Certified Repair Station which specializes in repair and reconditioning of helicopter rotor blades. Renny, and his brothers Paul and Jimmy have operated their repair station for 20 years where they have provided services to helicopter operators all over the world. What an operation! Located near Black Rock, AR in three large industrial type buildings totaling 18,000 square feet of shop space and offices about 150 feet off the main highway, completely non-descript without any signs or markings that would give a passerby any idea of what the building houses, only to raise questions as for what purpose the buildings might be used. To adequately describe and do full justice to their operation will require another article. Renny and his brothers also have a TH-13, and 2 OH-58s.

On the trip home, Saturday evening, I recounted the great experience of the day with new friendships and hospitality of some very special folks, and the opportunity to visit that proud lady Outlaw 11 and the helicopter blade repair operation. I plan to return soon and collect on an offer by Jason for a ride in OL 11.

Thanks, Phil Horne for nudging me to make this memorable trip!

<u>POSTSCRIPT</u>: There are many to thank who provided the leads to and history of OL 11: Jason for his persistence in seeking of information regarding the history and tracking of OL 11 through the years; Jim Donnelley in his quest for accurately pursuing the Vinh Long Outlaws history and adding to that of OL 11; Jim Burroughs former CE OL 6 for pegging the former CE of OL 11 for Jason; and finally, Phil Horne CE OL 11 who verified UB-1B (63-8704) as the original OL 11 and set the wheels in motion for the visit.



I introduced myself and told him I was retired from the Army. For about thirty minutes we "talked Army." He was full of questions, which I tried to give him honest answers to. He said his contract guaranteed him a slot in Special Forces after Infantry Basic.

Of course, I introduced him to the reality of being a "GRUNT" and the privilege of being in the "elite aviation brotherhood" of the US Army. He said he hoped to get into aviation after he had been in awhile. We talked about the 160<sup>th</sup> Aviation Company, which he was familiar with.

This was a nice young man, educated and well spoken. I couldn't help thinking that maybe, just maybe, we old soldiers can rest in the knowledge that "all is well in this man's army."

That night, I prayed a special prayer that God would take care of this young man and all the other young men and women like him.

# WHERE DOES THE VLOA TREASURY GET ITS MONEY?

The primary purpose of our Vinh Long Outlaws Association is to have a reunion every two years for all of us who served together nearly half a century ago. Our Constitution even states that the first objective of the organization is "to renew and preserve the camaraderie and esprit de corps among members of the VLOA".

Each of our reunions has been WONDERFUL! The camaraderie among the attendees is unbelievable.

Those who have attended will confirm that each reunion has been nothing less than "first-class". To achieve this level, however, every reunion coordinator has had to balance the costs of providing all the expected amenities against the reality of keeping the cost-per-person within feasible limits. This is not easy!

When we formed the VLOA, back in 2000, there was no treasury. Several individuals among the "Charter Members" each contributed some donations to initialize a small treasury to fund the costs of the fledgling Newsletter. The first membership meeting approved an annual "membership fee", however that income barely covered the Newsletter costs. And, our income from annual memberships is now decreasing because many members have opted for a Life Membership.

And, as you know, reunions cost money! In order to provide money for such items as refreshments, banners, signs, gratuities, recognition and thank-you gifts, etc., the first reunion coordinators resorted to including a small fee on top of each attendees costs to cover these expenses. Then, several reunions ago, we began our spirited 50-50 program to provide a secondary funding source for the treasury. We also established the popular "Silent Auction" program to further augment the treasury.

Those two programs, (50-50 and Silent Auction) have become the principle means by which the VLOA can put significant money into the treasury. Therefore it's obvious that the treasury has been built, and sustained, primarily by those who <u>attend</u> the reunions. And, it follows that the treasury should be used to continue to make the reunions as first-class as possible.

The upcoming reunion in Nashville will again be  $1^{st}$  class! Frank and Ann Estes have worked tirelessly with the staff at the Gaylord Opryland hotel to ensure that we will have a fantastic time. Yes, the cost of the reunion is slightly higher this year than previously, but so is everything else we face in our everyday life. And again, the treasury will be used to underwrite certain amenities for R2K10.

At the Hershey reunion, the Silent Auction and 50/50 brought in somewhat less revenue than in previous years primarily because there were fewer attendees to bid on auction items or purchase 50-50 tickets. We hope that will change and we'll have a great turnout for the Nashville reunion R2K10. The treasury is still sound but will continue to need the support of those who attend the reunions. Thanks to everyone who has supported the 50-50 and Silent Auction in the past. They are great fun and are vital to the continuing success of the Vinh Long Outlaws Association. #### VLOA DUES By Frank Estes

Annual dues for membership in the Vinh Long Outlaws Association (VLOA) are due each January. Regular Membership is \$20 per year, and Life Membership is a one-time \$100 fee. Since we have very little income from other sources, we have to depend heavily on annual dues and Life Memberships to fund our quarterly *VLOA Newsletter* and website <u>www.vinhlongoutlaws.com</u>. Total annual costs for these two budget items are about \$2100. That means we need at least 105 Regular Membership renewals each year just to meet our financial obligations for the newsletter and website.

Dues are essentially the financial lifeblood of the VLOA. Dues and residual from each biennial reunion are what keeps the VLOA financially viable. In the past, we have had a lot of members who faithfully paid their dues at the beginning of each calendar year. However, in recent years, we have seen the level of payments drop markedly.

As of March 25, 2010 the following members have paid their annual dues of \$20, and two have joined as Life Members by paying the one-time \$100 fee.

#### JACK SANFORD PHOTO PRESENTED TO U.S. ARMY AVIATION WARFIGHTING CENTER By Frank Estes

On March 26, 2010, a brief ceremony was conducted at Sanford Hall, Fort Rucker, Alabama for the purpose of donating a photo/portrait of CPT (Promotable) Jack Sanford to the U.S. Army Aviation Warfighting Center. The photo/portrait is now hanging in Sanford Hall, along with other memorabilia of CPT Sanford's.

The genesis of this presentation and development of the photo/portrait was the brainchild of COL (Retired) William "Bill" Giese. Bill was a close and long-time friend of Jacks, and served with him on multiple occasions. They corresponded frequently while serving in the Army.

A few years ago, COL Giese found an old photo of CPT Sanford that was taken in May 1965 during an awards ceremony at Vinh Long, Vietnam. Jack sent a copy of this picture to Bill because of their close friendship. During a visit to Fort Rucker, Bill visited Sanford Hall, and noticed the walls had very little displayed about CPT Sanford. In turn, he began the arduous effort to get permission to hang an appropriate picture of Jack in Sanford Hall. It took the better part of two years to get the picture enlarged, touched up by an artist, and matted and framed in appropriate colors befitting of the décor of Sanford Hall.

Finally, Bill was able to get the presentation date finalized, and invited me to attend. He had attempted to get others close to Jack to attend by family situations precluded their attendance.

Much to our surprise, a great ceremony was planned by the Fort Rucker Public Affairs Office, where 25 young first and second lieutenants awaiting flight training attended the presentation ceremony. Bill and I both spoke for a few minutes each, and talked about the great leader, professional soldier, and friend we found in Jack Sanford. Afterwards, I spoke with all the lieutenants in attendance, shoke their hands, and congratulated them on their decision to serve their country. You could see the excitement in their eyes to be getting into the Army Aviation Branch's business. I was moved by their confidence, professionalism, candor, and commitment reflected in the few minutes I could spend with each soldier. You should be extremely proud of the soldiers we have serving our country

The inscription on the photo reads: Major Jackie W. Sanford, March 4, 1932 – June 16, 1965. My good friend, Jack, was the Gun Platoon Leader, Maverick Lead, of the 62<sup>nd</sup> Aviation Company Outlaws, operating out of Vinh Long in the Mekong Delta, RVN. He sent this awards presentation photo to me at Fort Rucker before being wounded and hospitalized in May 1965. Shortly after his return to duty, Jack was killed leading three UH-1B gunships on a rescue mission. A soldier's soldier, Jack received numerous awards for valor while serving in Korea and Vietnam...and five Purple Hearts. William Giese, Colonel, USA (Retired).

Hopefully, we will be able to find four or five members who are willing to take on this search responsibility and help keep our roster up to date.

We have updated our website Membership Page to reflect in "blue" color the names of VLOA members for whom we do not have a current address. Hopefully, this will help in obtaining a current address for our "lost Outlaws."

# VA Proposes Change to Aid Veterans Exposed to Agent Orange Proposed Regulation Change Adds Illnesses to List of Diseases Subject to Presumptive Service Connection for Herbicide Exposure

WASHINGTON – Well over 100,000 Veterans exposed to herbicides while serving in Vietnam and other areas will have an easier path to qualify for disability pay under a proposed regulation published by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) that adds three new illnesses to the list of health problems found to be related to Agent Orange and other herbicide exposures.

"This is an important step forward for Vietnam Veterans suffering from these three illnesses," said Secretary of Veterans Affairs Eric K. Shinseki. "These warriors deserve medical care and compensation for health problems they have incurred."

The regulation follows Shinseki's October 2009 decision to add the three illnesses to the current list of diseases for which service connection for Vietnam Veterans is presumed. The illnesses are B cell leukemias, such as hairy cell leukemia; Parkinson's disease; and ischemic heart disease.

The Secretary's decision is based on the latest evidence of an association with widely used herbicides such as Agent Orange during the Vietnam War, as determined in an independent study by the Institute of Medicine (IOM).

Even though this is a proposed rule, VA encourages Vietnam Veterans with these three diseases to submit their applications for compensation now so the Agency can begin development of their claims and so they can receive benefits from the date of their applications once the rule becomes final.

Comments on the proposed rule will be accepted over the next 30 days. The final regulation will be published after consideration of all comments received.

"We must do better reviews of illnesses that may be connected to service, and we will," Shinseki added. "Veterans who endure health problems deserve timely decisions based on solid evidence."

Over 80,000 of the Veterans will have their past claims reviewed and may be eligible for retroactive payment, and all who are not currently eligible for enrollment into the VA healthcare system will become eligible.

During the Vietnam War, the U.S. military used more than 19 million gallons of herbicides for defoliation and crop destruction in the Republic of Vietnam. Veterans who served in Vietnam anytime during the period beginning January 9, 1962, and ending on May 7, 1975, are presumed to have been exposed to herbicides.

Used in Vietnam to defoliate trees and remove concealment for the enemy, Agent Orange and other herbicides left a legacy of suffering and disability that continues to the present.

The new rule will bring the number of illnesses presumed to be associated with herbicide exposure to 14 and significantly expand the current leukemia definition to include a much broader range of leukemias beyond chronic lymphocytic leukemia previously recognized by VA.

In practical terms, Veterans who served in Vietnam during the war and who have a "presumed" illness don't have to prove an association between their illnesses and their military service. This "presumption" simplifies and speeds up the application process for benefits.

Other illnesses previously recognized under VA's "presumption" rule as being caused by exposure to herbicides during the Vietnam War are:

AL Amyloidosis,

Acute and Subacute Transient Peripheral Neuropathy,

Chloracne or other Acneform Disease consistent with Chloracne,

Chronic Lymphocytic Leukemia, (now being expanded)

Diabetes Mellitus (Type 2),

Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma,

Porphyria Cutanea Tarda,

Prostate Cancer,

Respiratory Cancers (Cancer of the lung, bronchus, larynx, or trachea), and

Soft Tissue Sarcoma (other than Osteosarcoma, Chondrosarcoma, Kaposi's sarcoma, or Mesothelioma).

# A LETTER, OR A PHONE CALL?

Memory and specific details may fade after thirteen or fourteen years. No matter whether a letter or a phone call, whichever came first was maybe sometime in 1996 or was it 1997? Anyway, the event was essentially one original Outlaw attempting to locate another from '64 -'65 Vinh Long days. Perhaps it was a telephone call with the usual beginning, "where you been all these years" followed by each exchanging a recap of some thirty-three years or so, a few recounted war stories, and then a question as to the whereabouts of another specific Outlaw individual. The location and telephone number of the one being sought was obtained and provided by letter or phone call.

Some time passed, seemed appropriate to make a follow up call and see if the two had connected. Pick up the phone and dial the one being sought, a voice answers and immediately recognized as that other old Outlaw that was the subject of the search. Yes, the connection had been made, a long conversation followed as expected. Throughout the next few weeks additional telephone calls were exchanged between these two and an idea surfaced, what about a gathering together a few of the original Outlaws at some convenient location and discuss the possibility of a unit reunion. Sounded reasonable, several were contacted and agreed, a location was selected and the proverbial wheels started to grind out the details for a small three day event. The result, a meeting in 1997 of ten old Outlaws and nine wives at a central location where all regaled in renewed friendships, good food and entertainment. All endorsed the idea of a one time unit reunion of all original Outlaws from the time period August 1964 through September 1965 with the year 2000 as a reunion target date. This group, later known as the "Steering Committee" for the reunion developed a basic plan for a 2000 reunion which was later dubbed the R2K Outlaw Roundup.

Returning home from this initial gathering, all began the search of personal old military records, orders and such in order to assemble a roster of known names from that period. Approximately 500 names were eventually compiled as a master roster of those Outlaws assigned or attached anytime from August 1964 through September 1965, next step was a search to locate them. An untold number of phone calls were made, leads followed, blind alleys encountered and no less than a welcome dividend when positive contact was made. Result, some 250 confirmed contacts with personal information including address, telephone numbers, Email, wives names, period with the Outlaws, position and platoon/section.

In 1998, the Steering Committee together with a few others again met to finalize reunion plans, agree to the location and slate of accommodations, events, entertainment and food. Now the time to get the word out, so in May 1999 the first edition of the Vinh Long Outlaws News (later Newsletter) was dispatched by mail to the 250 confirmed contacts announcing the planned 2000 reunion.

September 2000 the R2K Outlaw Roundup Reunion saw Outlaws, Mavericks and Roadrunners gather with wives, friends and family members totaling one hundred and sixteen attendees who enjoyed 3 days and nights in Branson, Missouri. Planned as a one time event, the groups' unanimous consensus to continue to have biennial reunions attested to the success of the Branson event. From there, as the saying goes, "...the rest is history.". VLOA is now readying for it's SIXTH VINH LONG OUTLAWS ROUNDUP REUNION September 30 to October 4 in Nashville, Tennessee, AND now has expanded the VLOA membership to include ALL assigned and attached to the Outlaws who served ANYTIME during the VN conflict plus those follow on units who have military lineage and adopted the Outlaws as their logo.

What's the point of this dissertation. Well, it just takes a phone call or a letter from one old soldier to another to awaken and rekindle friendships that may start a meaningful reunion of old military comrades. The next time you receive such a phone call or letter no telling what adventure or journey awaits you with old friends and comrades.

It is with sincere thanks, gratitude and appreciation to Maverick John Sedam as he is the one who initiated that very first call or letter which sparked the contact between others and the idea of a Vinh Long Outlaws Reunion.
